# National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA) Stakeholder Engagement Meeting




We were honored to attend the National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA) Stakeholder Engagement Meeting, co-hosted by Lagos Business School (LBS).

The Five winners of the FlexiSAF Foundation's Incubator Program who received a micro-grant from FlexiSAF Foundation with the support of Nigeria Youth Futures Fund (NYFF) were able to successfully implement their projects.

#### 1. SafeNet Ambassadors by Gambo Maina Bawa









We are absolutely blown away by the successful project implementation by Gambo Maina Bawa, one of the five winners of the Incubator Program who received a micro-grant from Flex-iSAF Foundation with the support of Nigeria Youth Futures Fund (NYFF).

Gambo has truly outdone himself with his extraordinary project, "SafeNet Ambassadors", demonstrating vision and dedication as he makes a meaningful difference in the fight against cyberbullying and empowers school children to navigate the digital world responsibly.

This transformative initiative played a crucial role in tackling the pressing issues of cyberbullying and irresponsible internet use by equipping an incredible 532 students across nine schools with essential digital safety skills through innovative peer-to-peer training.

It's amazing to know that a parent shared with Gambo how the program has profoundly transformed her son's perspective, emphasizing the crucial need for parental involvement in future cohorts to truly understand their children's dreams and aspirations.

This is more than just a program; it's a movement that is reshaping our community! A massive round of applause for the visionary behind this initiative for spearheading such a monumental change! #### 2. Voice for Health by Hanifa Zakari



We are incredibly proud to showcase Hanifa Zakari Shuaibu's transformative "Voice for Health" project, aimed at addressing the high prevalence of sickle cell disease in Tiga, Bebeji Local Government, Kano State. As one of our outstanding Incubator Program winners, Hanifa received a micro-grant from FlexiSAF Foundation with the support of the Nigeria Youth Futures Fund (NYFF).

Hanifa's initiative is nothing short of remarkable! Through her commitment to community welfare, she has not only raised awareness about sickle cell disease but has also provided free genotype testing and screening for the youth. Her thoughtful decision to offer educational materials in Hausa demonstrates her profound understanding of the community's needs, ensuring that vital information is accessible to everyone. During her awareness session, 63 participants gathered to hear about the importance of genotype testing.

Hanifa's ability to connect with the audience was inspiring, and 37 youths benefited from free testing-a testament to her passion and effectiveness. The session was further enriched by a heartfelt story from a mother of two children living with sickle cell disease, which moved participants and emphasized the importance of awareness.

Hanifa's impact extends far beyond health education.

Her work highlights the broader issue of how chronic illnesses like sickle cell disease can disrupt children's education. Many children with this condition face frequent absences from school, and some are at risk of dropping out entirely due to their health challenges.

Thanks to Hanifa's dedication, participants now have the tools to make informed decisions that will protect their children's futures and promote healthier families.

### 3. #EmpowerKwaru Girls by Sadiq Sani Suleiman



We're excited to spotlight Sadiq Sani Suleiman and his inspiring "EmpowerKwaruGirls" project, made possible through a micro-grant from the FlexiSAF Foundation with the support of the Nigeria Youth Futures Fund (NYFF).

Sadiq, a dedicated young change-maker, has taken significant steps in addressing the educational barriers faced by disadvantaged girls, engaging over 50 community members in the Kwaru community, Kano State.

His efforts include digital literacy training and sensitization campaigns. Through these initiatives, he has empowered 20 girls with essential skills for their future. Notably, 10 of these girls are now part of a scholarship program at the Ajiyan Hausa ICT Enterprise, which offers them ongoing educational opportunities.

However, the journey has not been without challenges. A key finding was the lack of confidence among community members in navigating the internet-an alarming reality in 2024?!

In a world advancing in AI, it is important that every Nigerian can harness the power of technology. One of the program's success stories was that of Fatima, a young girl who initially struggled with using technology but now has a different story to tell. Through the program, she not only learned to use the internet but also gained the confidence to support her family with her newfound skills. Isn't that inspiring?

We are proud and in awe of leaders like Sadia, who are championing the FlexiSAF Foundation's vision that "no child should be denied the opportunity to learn and reach their full potential through quality education." His work truly speaks volumes, ensuring that no child is left behind!

## 4. Reusable Pads for Sustainable Menstrual Hygiene by Khairat Suleiman



**Exciting news from Kano Municipal!** 

We are truly impressed by Khairat Suleiman, a passionate advocate for women's health and one of the winners of our Incubator Program. As the visionary behind the "Reusable Pads for Sustainable Menstrual Hygiene" project, she is making a remarkable impact in her community by addressing period poverty.

With a micro-grant from the FlexiSAF Foundation, supported by the Nigeria Youth Futures Fund, Khairat trained 50 young girls to create durable, comfortable reusable sanitary pads, empowering them to overcome period poverty—a significant barrier to education for many girls. By equipping them with skills to make reusable menstrual pads, she ensures these girls have access to sustainable menstrual hygiene practices, enabling them to attend school consistently without interruption. This initiative also carries the hope that this knowledge will spread throughout their communities, paving the way for a future where every girl can thrive free from menstrual hygiene challenges.

One inspiring story from Khairat's project is that of Aisha, a participant who previously struggled with affordability, often relying on newspapers and old clothes. After attending Khairat's workshop, Aisha now feels empowered to make her own reusable pads, giving her greater confidence and comfort during her monthly cycle.

This project goes beyond providing pads; it's about dignity, empowerment, and connection. It reflects the FlexiSAF Foundation's mission of 'Education for All' by addressing issues that contribute to student dropout and absenteeism, helping to ensure consistent school attendance.

By promoting sustainable menstrual hygiene practices and offering a cost-effective solution for menstrual health, Khairat instills a sense of responsibility toward both personal well-being and the environment.

# 5. Reducing Juvenile Drug Abuse at Gwale Senior Secondary School by Abbas Alhassan Yusif



Meanwhile, teachers received training from experts on how to recognize early signs of abuse. To further ensure the entire school community had access to vital resources, informative pamphlets were distributed.

The main focus of the discussions was strengthening systems to ensure 12 years of free, safe, and quality education for every girl in Kaduna State with the key highlights being: Engaging with government leaders and community influencers to push forward the Gender-Responsive Education Sector Plans (GRESP) initiative. Powerful discussions on removing barriers to girls' education, including early marriage and hidden school fees. Inspiring success stories of girls whose lives have been changed by education!

Together, we plan to advance gender-equal education by strengthening partnerships, integrating life skills education, advocating for Gender-Responsive Education Sector Plans, and enhancing community engagement. We are optimistic about the potential to create a brighter future for girls!

## Redefining Marriage as a Financial Solution: A Safe Space Session with Our AccLearn Girls





To commemorate the 2024 International Day of the Girl Child, we held a session with the girls at one of our AccLearn learning centers, a space dedicated to nurturing their dreams and potential. The focus of our gathering was simple yet profound: to encourage each girl to share her career aspirations and visualize a future where her goals could become a reality. It was a powerful moment, as one by one, they expressed their hopes—some wanted to become doctors, others teachers, engineers, lawyers, and even soldiers or community leaders. A common theme emerged: they all wanted to help uplift their community.

But as they shared, I posed a question: "What do you think could hold you back from achieving these dreams?" For a moment, the room fell silent. Then, one girl's voice broke through, expressing what many were feeling but hesitant to say. "Ana aurar damu saboda a cewarsu, idan mukayi aure zamu rufama iyayenmu asiri, mu taimakawa kannen mu," she said, explaining that they are often married off because their families believe it will bring prosperity and support to their parents and siblings. The room grew still as the girls nodded in agreement, acknowledging that marriage loomed as an expectation long before they could complete their education or build a career.

The conversation shifted from dreams to the societal pressures they face, where marriage is seen as a form of "jari," or investment, a way for their families to secure financial support. Many of these young girls shared that their parents view marriage as a means to relieve financial burdens. Yet, the girls bravely pointed out a truth rarely spoken: the men they are often married off to lack the resources to support their own households, let alone bring the prosperity hoped for by the girls' families. They understood that marriage as a solution is often a misconception, a cycle that prevents families from realizing the true potential of their daughters.

Listening to them, I shared a simple but powerful phrase, "Aure ba jari bane ba," meaning, "marriage is not a business transaction." The words resonated deeply, and with conviction, they repeated after me, "Aure ba jari bane ba." In that moment, the phrase became a small but powerful mantra, an expression of their worth and a reminder that their dreams and potential could not be reduced to a transaction. They promised to take this message home, to speak with their families about their own aspirations, and to help their parents see that supporting their education and ambitions would bring far greater benefits in the long term.

The girls left the session not only with a clearer vision for their futures, but also with a commitment to redefine the narrative surrounding marriage within their communities. Their voices and resolve were a testament to the strength and resilience they carry. As they stand on the path to transforming both their own lives and the lives of those around them, they embody the hope that one day, a girl's worth will not be tied to marriage but to the endless possibilities she has to shape her destiny.
