Parents-Teachers Forum: Strengthening Collaboration for Better Learning Outcomes







Beneficiary Feature: Against All Odds: Aisha's Journey to Learning



Twelve-year-old Aisha Zakariya never thought she would have the chance to go to school. Growing up in the Disabled Colony in Karon Majigi, Abuja, she watched other children her age carry their books and head to class every morning while she stayed at home. Some of them laughed at her because she wasn't in school, but there was little she could do.

Her parents, both of whom are blind, struggled to provide for their large family. Her father managed a small kiosk, selling basic items to make ends meet, while her mother used to sell detergents and household goods from home but could no longer continue. With many children to cater for and very little income, sending Aisha to school was simply not an option.

For years, Aisha remained at home, watching as her dreams of education slipped further away. But everything changed when she was enrolled in Level 1 of the Accelerated Learning (AccLearn) Program. It was a moment of pure joy for her.

"I was so happy when I learned I would be going to school," she recalls.

For the first time, she felt like she belonged. Finally, she no longer had to feel different from other children.

Starting school was an entirely new experience for Aisha. She had never been in a classroom before, yet she quickly found her rhythm. She embraced every subject with enthusiasm and was determined to make the most of this opportunity.

Now in Level 2, Aisha is thriving. Unlike many children who struggle with certain subjects, she enjoys them all and looks forward to each lesson. Without the AccLearn program, she would have had no chance to get an education. But today, she is not only learning—she is dreaming. She hopes to become a tailor one day, using her skills to make beautiful clothes and support her family.

Aisha is deeply grateful for this opportunity. She thanks the foundation for putting her in school. For her, education is more than just reading and writing—it is a lifeline, a chance to build a future that once seemed impossible.



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
